Malvern Archives in Grade 10 History Inquiry

Ever since I realized Malvern had its own archives, I have wanted to figure out how to use them in my Grade 10 Canadian History classes. The how was key because I wanted to make it authentic and also provide learning to meet curriculum expectations at the same time.

My first step was to meet the Archives committee. Vandra Masemann and the team welcomed me, and I had my first look at what the possibilities were. I then spent an afternoon on a professional development day with the keys and had time to look more closely. As my mother, aunt, and grandfather all attended Malvern, I checked out if I could find any mention of them, and I did.

I wanted to use the archives to develop inquiry skills in my students, and for them to use artifacts that were not related to war. I decided to use the unit 1945-1982 as the focus. The task was students would search, and if they found something, that led them to ask questions, they would have a starting point. The goal was to connect their artifact to what was happening in Canada at the same time. One student found a file folder that had all the details of a visit by Joe Clark. She asked, "Who was Joe Clark?" She found out who he was and why he was at Malvern. She also connected with him in her enthusiasm to find out more. Another student wondered why a 1959 yearbook page had only one African Canadian student on the page. This question led her to investigate Canada's immigration and racist policies during this time.


The process started with a visit from the Toronto Museum staff. They brought some artifacts from World War I. Each small group got an artifact to hold and developed questions, the first step in an inquiry process.

Next they went to the archives, the most challenging part of the process as only 10 students could go at once, and of course classes are larger than that. Sometimes I had students in the hall outside, on the floor, other times I had volunteers stay with some students while I took the 10 to the archives. Sometimes students couldn't find an artifact that they were curious about, so they required two or more visits either during class or at lunch. Eventually all had one. Popular choices included pages from the old *Muses*, newspapers in the files, or random objects in the boxes of donations.

Students brainstormed questions with the artifact they chose, leading them to do more research and find other primary sources, often from the *Toronto Star* or CBC archives. To distribute their research, guests were invited so students could share their findings and answers. Some students used panel boards, and others created google docs or even their own websites. All in all, the Malvern archives provided students with great inspiration to engage in research and learning about Canada and Malvern at the same time. (Jan Haskings-Winner is one of 25 finalists across Canada for the Governor-General's History Award for Excellence in Teaching.)

The Spring 2016 issue of *Musings* focused on the 90th birthday of Malvern's beloved music teacher, George McRae. We receive a number of feedback comments and were given permission to print the following from Mike Ord, class of 1968.

It was around 1966 and football season. Being on the football team or being a cheerleader were good reasons for missing a band assignment, but I had a part-time job at the Dominion Store on Kingston Road. Work was not a good excuse, so I skipped the band and went to work. We played at most football games. I was standing at Victoria Park and Kingston Road waiting for the lights to change. Just my luck, the band bus was turning the corner, and Mr. McRae was seated in the perfect position to see me. He did, and I knew it. The next day in music class he asked me why I missed the football game. I explained. He was a little annoyed and said "You're out of the band....for awhile." Band practice was the next day. That's "awhile." I went, and I never heard another word. Music at Malvern and Mr. McRae was the best. He's 90? Incredible! Wonderful man!

The MRBS Salutes Barbara (Williamson) Farrow, class of 1956, for her Herculean Labours to Repair the Malvern Band Uniforms by Vandra Masemann

Barb Farrow has just finished a six-week project this summer in which she and her volunteers repaired and reconstructed all of the Malvern band uniforms. There were 109 pieces in all, with 50 kilts and 59 jackets. What an amazing feat! We salute her efforts to contribute to Malvern and its band. This was a true example of the Malvern Spirit – a common-sense and frugal solution to a problem and an appeal to the spirit of the Malvern community.

I interviewed Barb in her sewing room when the task was finished to find out more about her. She lived on Juniper Avenue off Lee Avenue as a child and attended Williamson Road School. She learned to sew in Home Economics class there with Miss Younge, as well as with her mom. After training and working as a nurse, she married Stan Farrow, who was a teacher at David and Mary Thomson C.I. for many years. They had three children, one girl and two boys, and Barb sewed their clothes when they were young. After they were grown, she sewed costumes for the community Gilbert and Sullivan productions at David and Mary Thomson C.I. I was impressed by the spacious sewing room in her basement, with evidence of many projects done over the years. She clearly had the facilities and the knowledge to do this task.



After our appeal for funds in the Spring 2016 *Musings* to help with repairs and replacements of the Malvern band uniforms, Barb contacted me with an alternative solution. She wanted to organize a project by appealing to Malvernites past and present to help sew and repair the Malvern band uniforms.

She was willing to co-ordinate the project, to store the uniforms in her home sewing room, to supervise the volunteers and to complete the project in time for the September return to school. When we asked Mr. Falla, the director of the band, and Principal Diane Sharpe (and a former colleague of Barb's husband), they were both in agreement with the proposal. This common-sense idea would allow the school to use the donations already received to buy any new uniforms required. Total expenses for the project were just under \$105, plus many hours of labour.

While the school was still open in June, Mr. Falla had all of the uniforms moved down to the Tech classroom on the main floor. Barb and I then went through all of the kilts and jackets in a system of triage, identifying all of the symptoms of disrepair on a pink card which she pinned to each piece. This orderly approach was in keeping with her training as a nurse at the Toronto East General Hospital in the 1950s.

She transported all of the items home in her van and set them up on racks in her sewing room. She then recruited two friends, Mary Hill and Pam (Charles) de Groot (a fellow Malvernite); and I put out the call on Facebook for more volunteers. Vicky Tsorlinis, a long-time Home and School volunteer and executive member, sewed on innumerable buttons, which we were lucky to get from the tailor who had made the original uniforms. Anna Kennedy and Barbra Mitchell also volunteered, but distance and summer holidays limited their availability. The most common repair made was to the kilts where the belt had damaged the material as it was being tugged into place. There were also many repairs needed to the lining of the jackets and the white trim. Some moth holes were found, which were repaired with a not-so-invisible patch on the inside. Generally, Barb did all of the machine repairs herself and the volunteers did the hand sewing. Some of the damage was the result of lack of care or mistreatment of the uniforms. Food stains were a major factor. It is hoped that uniforms will be better cared for now that students know how much effort was put into renewing them. .

Barb has also offered to be the on-call person for uniform repairs so that small tears do not get the chance to get worse.

Malvernites we think you may want to know about:

University of Toronto Varsity Blues alumna and Toronto native, Kristine Drakich has been the head coach of the women's volleyball program since 1989-90. Under her direction, the Blues qualified for 22 consecutive Ontario University Athletics (OUA) final four appearances from 1990-2010, winning the OUA championship banner seven times. **She led the Blues to a 25-0 perfect season in 2015-16, claiming their second straight OUA banner, and first-ever CIS championship in program history.** Kristine earned her first Canadian Interuniversity Sport coach of the year honours in 2014-15.
