If you utilize these benefits then the MRBS receives financial support too.

We will continue a full schedule of activities to "Keep Malvernites in Touch". This takes money. That is why we support the OMF and will continue our own revenue generating activities. We carefully consider the appropriateness of everything we do and our members' privacy is always our prime concern.

Here are fond memories of some of those '50's alumni of their days at MCI.....

Rod Tennyson (Class of 56) B.A.Sc., M.A.Sc., Ph.D., F.C.A.S.I., P.Eng. Director, University of Toronto Institute for Aerospace Studies (1985 -1995)

I attended Malvern from 1951 to 1956---some of my fondest memories are from those days. When I graduated and went on to university (Toronto, Engineering Physics, Aerospace), the "best" days vanished and the real world had to be faced--tough competition from all over Canada, little time to play, stress levels rising just to succeed.

Malvern was a "home" away from home - great buddies, fantastic girl friends, caring teachers who wanted you to succeed, sports, acting club, and Friday night dances. I remember some teachers very well. Mr. Warren - grade 9, who taught us gym (I learned to do back flips there), junior football coach, learned algebra--took me a few weeks to catch on! Other notable teachers were Mr. Sage, Mr. Rhamey, Mr. Kerr, Mr. Jewell (ended up a few times in his office!), Mr. Stulac --the one the girls went crazy over...he talked me out of becoming a teacher when I went to college.

Our French teacher for several years, (Mr. Wakefield), a great guy, always answered a question on why a certain phrase was used by saying, "If 50 million Frenchmen say it that way, so will you!" We learned Latin because we were told it would help us with other languages, and be useful for those who went into medical school--they were partially right.

Malvern taught me discipline mixed with a great school attitude, high standards and emphasis on sports and broadening one's perspective. Who can forget the annual track meets down at the Beaches, with parades for boys in itchy brown military uniforms and wooden rifles. Cleft over from the war days I guess. The super Malvern band that played in the parades and in the regular sessions we had in the auditorium. I recall when Teresa Stratas sang for the school--she had just won a competition at the CNE--most of us guys had never heard opera singing and the powerful voice coming from someone so small! She of course went on to fame and glory. The Grade 13 exams and the preparation for them was the only stressful time I can recall while attending Malvern--except for

worrying about track and football competitions and whether a particular girl really liked me.... We were given a week off in June (very hot that year) to study, and our performance determined whether we graduated and went to university.

I learned to envy those who came from the Beach--many came from families with considerable wealth (relative to my environment)--I came from the other side of the tracks (north of Danforth), as did Teresa. This experience instilled a great desire to succeed and the only route I saw was to make sure I went to university as far as I could go.

In retrospect this was the best experience I could have hoped for in the teenage years where too many diversions were available. The combination of high academic standards, with athletic competitions, access to cultural activities (acting club, music etc.) for those so inclined, combined with strong discipline paved the way... I am indebted to the Malvern staff for most of what prepared me for later in life.

As the "Boss" says, those were the Glory Days!!

My name is Beth McGregor (nee Patterson) and I graduated in 1956. I remember I used to walk to school every day from my home on Enderby Road to Malvern Collegiate. Enderby Road is one block west of Main Street. I walked north on Enderby to Swanwick and east along Swanwick to Malvern Avenue, about five or six blocks. (In those days one didn't ask their parents for a ride!) Most of the time it seemed like a very long walk to me, however, on several occasions I was joined by a young girl and our chats made the time go by more quickly.

We would usually talk about our weekend activities, vacations, family, you know the usual things. I remember one day she mentioned that she was taking singing lessons. I was a little envious of her because she was so attractive and outgoing and seemed so worldly. I still remember the day we had assembly and she was invited to sing. Then I found out just how special she really was (and is). What a beautiful voice! Of course it was Teresa Stratas. I credit Teresa for giving me an appreciation for opera.

The MRBS encourages groups from every decade to organise reunions for particular decades or years. We are happy to facilitate these happy events. The MRBS provides publicity through our newsletter and directed emailings (protecting the privacy of our members at all times), archival research, historical displays, and logistical support to graduates in forming organisational committees.

Balmy Beach Community School Celebrates its Centennial on May 12, 2007

Balmy Beach Community School will be celebrating 100 years of learning. The school is calling on all former students and staff to celebrate its Centennial at a reunion next May 12, 2007.

Originally named Pine Avenue School, Balmy Beach Community School was built in 1906 and opened with three teachers and a principal in January, 1907. The School was expanded over the next two decades, reaching a capacity of 827 students in 21 classrooms. In the early 1970s, plans to replace the old structure were approved and, with the community's input, a new Balmy Beach was built to be an integral part of the neighbourhood serving pre-schoolers, school-age children, adults and senior citizens.

Progress Report: 2006 MCI Marching Band Fundraising Project

We wish to thank everybody who responded to Bill Mighton's appeal to support the M.C.I. Marching band program. So far in 2006 you have helped us to raise over \$3500 to buy new musical instruments.

After a long hiatus, Malvern C.I. successfully launched a return of the marching band program. We were a big hit in the April 2006 *Beach Easter Parade* and plan to return again in 2007. We have accepted an invitation to participate in an inaugural *Beach Santa Claus Parade* scheduled for November, 2006 (with a planned route down Kingston Road), as well as receiving an invitation to the prestigious downtown *Santa Claus Parade*, also in November. The Malvern Marching Band, an important symbol of M.C.I.'s presence in the community, is very much back in the public eye.

Over the 2005-2006 school year we put 55 band members in the famous Malvern kilt and tunic, and we look forward to greater numbers for 2006-2007! Uniforms that have been in use for many years, many since the 1960s, are wearing out or simply don't fit today's larger students. One new uniform (tunic, kilt, hat, and garters) costs over \$1400. Money for uniforms is not available in the regular school budget, but must be obtained through continued fund-raising. The Marching Band Project is helping to revitalize an important tradition, and Malvern's community image.

Many thanks for your continued support and we hope you will find the time to see the marching band in action at these future events.

As the current students of Malvern decide what to wear on the first day of school an age old debate may rear its ugly head.....

A picture appeared in *Toronto Telegram*, Sept. 15, 1954 of 3 Malvern boys with the caption " Fred Waters in jeans: Homeward-bound after school, Malvern Collegiate student Fred Waters, centre, wears controversial jeans, with schoolmates Tony Eeglon, left, and Jim Watt in more common strides."

The storm blew up when Malvern principal J.L.Kerr announced he would phone parents of about 30 jean-clad pupils, objecting to the denim trousers. (Today the parents, with few exception, wholeheartedly agreed with him!)

A flurry of letters to the Editor and related articles appeared.....

**BOYS IN JEANS OUT AT MALVERN PRINCIPAL HOPES
(Sept 1954 B no paper mentioned)**

Jeans are Aout@ for the boys at Malvern.

Principal J.L.Kerr of Malvern Collegiate Institute and his teachers feel that sloppy appearance of the blue denim, copper-studded trousers give their wearers a sloppy approach to academic studies.

At first, Principal Kerr considered a Aboys-with-jeans-can=t-play-sports@ regulation but now says he will phone parents of the boys (about 25 or 30) who wear jeans, pointing out teachers= objections.

If parents approve, however, the jeans will stay.

THINKS JEANS ALL RIGHT (Toronto Star, Sept. 1954)

To the Editor of the *Star*.

Sir: I read that the principal of a high school objects to his boy students wearing jeans to school. This in not England where you have to wear an old school tie or you are definitely not in the elite. This is democratic Canada. I am hard put to buy jeans for my grandson at \$5 a pair. He changes them twice a week and is always clean and that should be all that is necessary. He is in junior high school and is not clothes conscious. He is mostly interested in his studies. I dread the day when he washes his ears without being told and slicks his hair with grease because then I shall know he is girl conscious. At present he hates all women (me excepted of course)

USE OF JEANS IN SCHOOL (Ottawa Citizen Editorial, Sept. 1954)

Down in Toronto, where there always seems to be something new doing these days, the principal of Malvern Collegiate Institute, Mr. J.L. Kerr, wants a regulation prohibiting boys from wearing blue jeans. He contends that sloppy jeans lead to sloppy minds, and some members of the Board of Education support his *non sequitur*. It might be argued that sloppy habits of thinking, such as relating dress to intellectual capacity, is what leads to sloppy minds. Certainly, Mr. Kerr=s students don=t seem adversely affected by their jeans, because their first reaction was to take a look at the fact. Two years ago, their school had the highest percentage of fifth-year students to pass in the province.

To be sure, a slovenly appearance may be distasteful, but that is a different matter from sloppy thinking. An esthetic objection is valid, but is open to dispute. The appearance that one man dislikes,

and I want him to stay that way for a long time. When a boy becomes clothes and girl conscious, his studies go out the window. We mothers and grandmothers have troubles enough without trying to buy fancy slacks for our boys.

May I, in all humility, suggest that Mr. Kerr stick strictly to his duties as director of the school and leave the matter of clothing to the judgment of the parents who know their own ability to pay.

Exciting news! On Thursday June 15, 2006 a happy announcement was made by Kyle MacDonald and Jim Hogarth. Working in close unison with MCI principal Line Pinard and her staff, the James D. Hogarth Award scholarship fund will be started. Kyle has been invited as the keynote speaker at MCI's November 10, 2006 Commencement and the first award will be presented.

Kyle MacDonald attended MCI from 1972-1977, where in addition to her excelling academically and athletically, she became the first female Student Council President at Malvern. It is during this time that Kyle and Mr. Hogarth became close friends, which continues to this day.

Upon graduation from MCI, Kyle attended The University of Western Ontario, where she graduated with MBA honours. Her success has continued to this day. She is the founder and CEO of Phoenix Interactive which she has led to international business success. Kyle is certainly a distinguished Malvernite.

Why this scholarship? Kyle has very happy memories of MCI, but also remembers the financial struggles she overcame to finish her university career. This scholarship is to honour Jim Hogarth and to make it financially possible for one student a year to begin university. It is her way to give back to Malvern.

What is the award? A 20-year commitment has been made to fund this award. Each year a financial sum of \$10,000 will be awarded to one Malvern C.I. graduate who is planning to attend post-secondary school. The winner will be selected based upon financial need. A fundamental question will be, 'would our candidate be able to start post-secondary school without this award?'

The MRBS applauds the generosity and school spirit of Kyle MacDonald and Jim Hogarth. We also applaud the teamwork of Kyle, Jim, Line Pinard and her staff. This spirit of cooperation made this award a reality. Malvernites care.
