Even if you cannot attend the show, we welcome donations made by cheque (War Memorial in the memo line) or online to the Onward Malvern Foundation (see our new Donations Page). It is imperative that we raise funds that can be matched dollar for dollar. Please help by joining us at the show or by donating to the Onward Malvern Foundation for this cause. Only OMF donations will be tax receiptable. We have saved the Malvern Pool; now let us restore the Malvern War Memorial.

Now here is some background on this campaign which has sprung into life only since May of this year.

One of the most rewarding aspects of our work is to look in the Archives for information you may request or in our database to find friends whom we can notify that you are looking for them. This activity has contributed to a shared sense of community, which grows every year. It stretches around the world and back in time to Malvern's early days as vou often ask for details of Malvern's older grads. Grads have commented on how distressed they are to see the Malvern War Memorial in its present state. But the time was never quite right for the Toronto District School Board.

We are appealing to this sense of community to remedy this problem which many of us saw when we attended the Malvern Centennial in 2003. The statue is a symbol of the school, and its current state detracts from our generally positive academic, athletic, and artistic reputation. It was most embarrassing when the *Toronto Sun* ran a front page banner headline on May 18 saying "Losing Battle: No cash for broken war memorial" with a full page photo of the

statue. This headline was enough to galvanize the TDSB to pay for having an assessment made of the cost of repairing and maintaining the statue, and encouraging us to set up a committee to raise funds.

It was also enough to motivate Mr. Dan Coldwell of the PACE Credit Union to donate the first large donation of \$10,000 to this project in June. We also have a backlog of about \$2,600 of community donations which some of you have sent in recent years in your efforts to urge us to get moving on this restoration. Thank you so much for prodding us! As this monument has been officially registered as a war memorial, we are also eligible to apply for federal government funds to match what the community raises up to \$25,000. It will take all of this and more to do what is required to leave this memorial in a fit state for future generations.

We are launching an urgent campaign as of now to raise the funds to restore the statue and to repair the structural weaknesses at its base, so that we can apply for matching funds this fall in the October rounds of the Veterans' Affairs competitions for grants. Carl Lehmann (1865-1949), Principal of MCI for 25 years from 1910 to 1935 by Paula Warder

This article is the second in a series about former Principals of Malvern. The MRBS Archives Committee is researching the history of all the Malvern C.I. principals from 1903 (Mr. Cecil French) to the present (Ms. Line Pinard). These histories will be collected

and stored in the Malvern Library and also posted on the MRBS website.

Malvern's longest serving principal was well-respected and much loved by staff and students alike. His portrait and statue are on display in the school library. Through his leadership, our War Memorial and the Memorial Book were completed.

Carl's parents immigrated to Sparrow lake Ontario in 1863 where they raised five sons and a daughter. After a disastrous fire in the area, they moved to Orillia the shores of Lake Couchiching. His brother Adolph became a professor of chemistry in Edmonton while their brother Julius became a physician in Winnipeg. A third brother Rudolph owned a farm on Maple Drive in Orillia. When his brother Rudolph died in 1923, Carl supported his three orphaned nieces in his own home in Orillia called Gosworth Hall.

Carl was the science master at Jarvis Collegiate before becoming Malvern's principal in 1910. He gave the first known demonstration in Canada of wireless telegraphy in 1901. At Gosworth Hall, he hosted many parties for Malvern's staff.

Their nearest neighbours were Capt. Henry Pellat and his wife, Emma Mary Holland (the parents of Sir Henry Pellatt of Casa Loma) who had retired to their summer home, Southwood, in 1892. When Emma Mary died in 1901, their eldest daughter Mary Kate Hamilton and her daughter, Beatrix, joined him there. Beatrix was later to marry Stephen Leacock, leaving Mary Kate to watch over Karl's nieces while he was in Toronto attending to his duties at Malvern. She also attended many formal events with him in Toronto. The two of them traveled by car to the Chicago

World's Fair in 1933 together with his nieces, Eva, Alberta and Beatrix.

Mary Kate's brother, Fred Pellat, was the chauffeur for Stephen Leacock and his wife Beatrix for many years. Another of Carl's nieces, Mary (daughter of Adolph) became the mother of Karl Jaffary, a former Toronto politician.

Alumni/ae Profiles: Matthew Jocelyn


Musings editor Adele Ashby interviewed Malvern alumnus, Matthew Jocelyn, in August just before he was about to begin rehearsals for Canadian Stage's first production of the 2010-11 season, Fernando Krapp wrote me this letter: An attempt at the truth, which opens on 18 September.

Matthew is the son of one of Malvern's most beloved teachers, A. Gordon Jocelyn, who taught English from 1959-1963 and elsewhere. He grew up in a family devoted to the theatre. As a young man, his father was part of the first season of the Stratford Festival internationallywhere he dressed renowned actors such as Alec Guiness and James Mason. Matthews's grandmother lived in a house very near the festival's theatre, and he was initiated to the theatre at a very young Then the family moved to the Beach in Toronto and his father began teaching at Malvern. When it was Matthew's turn to go to Malvern, the school had an active drama programme, although Matthew was more involved in student politics than in being part of it. He did, however, mount one production Before Matthew began of his own. Malvern, his father took a sabbatical year during which Matthew travelled around Europe with his parents. It was during this trip that Matthew saw a production of Dylan Thomas' Under the milkwood in a church basement in Wales. It was, he says, "a seminal moment." When he got back home, he organized a group from his English class to present a dramatic reading of it.

It was this year of travels that gave Matthew a taste for another world, that for the wealth of art and culture of Europe. He went to France for a year when he was 19, and moved back to Europe three years later, in 1980. He then led a peripatetic life, ranging over England, France, Poland, and Italy, with the bulk of his career in France, most recently running the Atelier du Rhin, the only multi-disciplinary centre of its kind in the country. In 2008, he was awarded the Chevalier des Arts et des Lettres, France's highest performing arts honour.

Matthew had made occasional visits back home. He had already done a production for Richard Monette at Stratford, *The liar*, was a guest director in the University of Toronto's theatre programme for a term where he produced a play, and put together a play with a group of retired actors.

In 2009, he was offered the position of Artistic and General Director Toronto's Canadian Stage Company, and when interviewed, told its board of directors that if he were to come, he would not be able to continue with its current aesthetic. He sees his own as being more challenging, more innovative, one that he feels can find a home in Toronto, which he sees as truly multicultural, international, sophisticated, and ready to move into the twenty-first century, with its new cultural outlooks from the renovated Royal Ontario Museum, Art Gallery of Ontario, its new opera house, and much more. He has shortened the name to Canadian Stage to highlight the sense that it is a place where Canadian international stars, such as Robert Lepage and Edouard Lock of La La Human Steps, will know that they have a Canadian venue for their works. as well as for great works from around the world. "In the next phase of this company, we will produce work that at times challenges the classical notions of theatre and, more importantly, has its place in a contemporary international context," explains Matthew. "Our goal is to create a theatre centre that is as modern, diverse and dynamic as this country warrants and this city deserves."

Did you know? . . .

That the golf course where the Canadian Open was played this year was designed by a Malvernite? Stanley Thompson attended Malvern with his brothers Frank and Nicol before the First World War. As Canada's leading golf course architect of his time, he designed the golf course at the St. George's Golf and Country Club in Etobicoke. It opened in 1929 and has hosted the Canadian Open five times.
