Malvernites in the Berlin War Cemetery — Vandra Masemann

Squadron Leader Donald Mackenzie Arnot, DFC ((Pilot, RCAF), Warrant Officer II James Roy Robert Small (Navigator, RCAF). Flight Lieutenant John (Jack) James Stephen (Pilot, RCAF), and Flight Sergeant Victor Joseph August Wintzer (Bomb Aimer, RCAF).

I made a trip to Germany last April for a meeting in Hamburg, and the idea occurred to me that my husband and I could take the time to visit the graves of some Malvernites fallen in World War II. David Fuller, a Malvern parent who is researching the history of Malvern's participation in both World Wars, gave me the names of four airmen who were buried in the Berlin War Cemetery along with just under 3500 others from Canada and other Commonwealth countries.

We took the subway out west of Berlin to a stop quite near the Olympic Stadium. It was a dreary wet day, and when we entered the cemetery we saw no sign of anyone or any information about the location of the graves. The only sign was one that contained an apology for the roughed-up state of the grass, on account of an invasion of wild boars! Indeed the grass was gouged and dug up over much of the terrain, but it was being slowly restored. By this point the rain had begun in earnest. As we had thought to bring umbrellas, we decided to visit every one of the graves to locate the four Malvernites buried among the many rows. It was a very interesting visit, seeing all the many young airmen's graves, most of whom had died aged between 19-29 years of age. They were from Canada, Great Britain, Australia, New Zealand, and India. Most had crosses on their graves, but a few were Jewish, with the Star of David instead. I put a small stone on all of these latter gravestones as is customary. Some non-military men were buried here too, such as the war correspondent from the Sydney Herald in Australia. There was also a section for the graves of the wives and descendants of these men. The graves were well tended, with plants growing in front of all of them. It was a very worthwhile way to spend the two hours walking up and down every row.

My husband found the graves of the Malvernites, and I put a red rose on each of the four graves. We paid our respects to each of them and then went to lay the rest of the roses on the main altar in the middle of the cemetery in honour of all of those young men and a few women who died.

By now, we were wet up to the knees and chilled. We left by the main gate again, and only then did we notice an alcove in the stone wall with a metal door opening to a book with the names and locations of all the graves. We signed the Visitors' Book on behalf of the Malvern Red and Black Society. As we walked back to the subway station, we saw a welcoming pub and restaurant where we took shelter from the rain and ate a hearty lunch. Our minds were

on all the young people whose lives had been cut short.

It was a most moving visit, and if any MRBS members wish to visit the graves of Malvernites fallen in the World Wars, they may contact David Fuller to see where Malvernites are buried in the cemeteries that might be close to their trip destination in France, Germany, Holland, or Belgium. Students have received support to attend competitions, to defray travel and accommodation expenses for sports events, and to set up new clubs. These extra expenses often occur because Malvernites have won local competitions (e.g., in sports or music) and need to travel to regional and even national finals. Even more important is the increase in school spirit that the existence of the MRBS has brought about, in assuring the current students that earlier Malvernites care about the school and the activities and achievements of the current students. This past year has been taken up with two major undertakings. The first was the 40s/50s/60s Reunion at the Balmy Beach Club on 14 May 2011. You can read more about this highly successful event in this Musings. Our second year-long task was the fund-raising campaign to restore our Malvern Cenotaph. We are very happy to report that we raised over \$30,000 from alumni and friends, and were granted an additional \$14,000 from Veterans' Affairs Canada. We are enormously grateful to all the generous alumni donors. The restoration of the statue took place over the summer of 2011. This work involved the stabilization of the base by the TDSB, and the restoration of the statue, the repair of the letters of the names, and the re-attachment of the hand and the sword by experienced conservator Susan Maltby, who has worked on several similar projects.

Now for the good news. The Cenotaph will be unveiled on the afternoon of Friday 4 November 2011 in a historic event attended by political notables from every level, school board officials, donors, staff, students, and alumni. The Malvern Band and Choir will participating, as be well representatives from various military regiments. We will be gathering at 1:00 p.m. in front of the school for the 2:00 p.m. ceremony. The ceremony will not be an Act of Remembrance but the official unveiling of the restored cenotaph. More information be posted on our website www.malverncollegiate.com approach that date. Message from the Treasurer – Evan J. Butchers

As your MRBS treasurer, I am pleased to report the following brief summary of our financial position as of our fiscal year end, 30 June 2011. As reported at the 2010 year end, we were in a positive position with a balance of \$2,349.85. I am pleased to report that as of June 30, 2011, we are again in a positive position with a balance of \$4001.84, mainly due to the generosity of a number of Malvernites who donated at our May 2011 40s, 50s & 60s reunion. These funds enable us to carry on the work of the MRBS. A great portion of these funds is used to publish our newsletter, *Musings*, which keeps Malvernites abreast of our activities.

We were able to continue with our annual award of \$100 to a Malvern student, Samantha Bright, at Commencement in November 2010, and we were also privileged to make a donation of \$500 to the Malvern Music Department in recognition of its contribution to the success of our 2011 "Musically Malvern" themed reunion, which honoured Mr. George McRae on the occasion of his 85th birthday and which featured a presentation by an Alumni/ae Band under his direction as well as the current Malvern Dance Band.

Furthermore, we have raised \$30,678.10 specifically earmarked for the Malvern War Memorial Restoration project now underway.

At our annual meeting, I will present a full detailed report to our members, which will be posted on our website.

In Memoriam

It is with great sadness that we inform you of the deaths of the following former Malvernites:

Elizabeth Susan Davey (B.A., B.Ed., M. Ed.) died peacefully in Orangeville on 16 April 2011, aged 67. Susan was a Malvern band member and graduate who went on to teach music at Malvern and other schools and then to serve as a principal for the Toronto District School Board. Like her mother Phyllis before her, she was active in advocating for gender equity in the teaching profession. After her retirement, she was was instrumental in setting up intergenerational programs between seniors

and elementary schools. She lived in her later years in Alton, Ontario, where she was Chair of the Alton Village Association. A tree has been planted in her memory at the Dods & McNair Memorial Forest at the Island Lake Conservation Area in Orangeville.

Sheldon H. 'Shelly' Lush (1918-2011) was born in Toronto's east end and attended Malvern from 1933 to 1938. He was the eldest child of Harold and Ethel Lush and the first of five siblings to make Malvern their Collegiate home. He won the George C. Powell Memorial Trophy in 1938 for best character, exemplifying leadership, scholarship, and athletics. The trophy was created in memory of George C. Powell who drowned in Gull Lake near Minden on 23 July 1934, after saving the lives of two small children. For many years, the trophy was presented by former friends and classmates of Powell. In his time at M.C.I., "Shelly" Lush was in form 3A Miss Cunningham's 1934-35 class. He moved on to form 4B in 1935-36 under Mr. Taylor where he earned a graduation and upper school credit in trigonometry with 3rd class honours. was a member of the Upper School baseball champions that year. In 1936-37, he was in Mr. Blakeley's class with David Hayne, another much-remembered former student of Malvern. His brother Jack was in 3B with Miss Muirhead and younger siblings Mildred (1C Mr. Burke) and Donald (1B Mr. Nixon) were commencing their time at MCI. That year Mrs. H. (Ethel) Lush, their mother, wrote to the editor of the Malvern Muse on behalf of the Home and School Association. "Shelly" joined Glenn Munro as teammates on the Senior Hockey (Major) team coached by Mr. Jewell. He played rugby for the first time on the school's senior team also led by Mr. Jewell. Shortly after graduation from Malvern "Shelly" was married to Betty, and over the years they brought five children into their world. Those offspring gifted them with fifteen grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Donald Gordon 'Rick' Ottaway (1933-2011) graduated from University of Toronto in Mechanical Engineering, Class 5T5 and

went on to do his MBA at York University. He started his business career at Massey Ferguson. From there, he rapidly rose to numerous senior-level positions including President and Board Directors of Crush International, President and CEO of Maple Leaf Monarch, CEO of ADM Canada, and CEO of Dutch Chemicals. He was also selected to sit on OBAC (Ontario Business Advisory Council), with other CEOs from Ontario's largest corporations, to advise the premier on strategic issues. During his business career, he became known for his ability to turn companies around and boost corporate performance. At 6' 6", Rick was an avid football player and champion basketball player in his youth. Growing up in the Beach, skipping stones into the lake, he developed a throwing arm that later enabled him to throw a football further than anyone he knew. "OK, we need a touchdown, Rick take the ball, everyone else run for the end zone!" became the call. His throw was known as "The Ottaway Pass." After high school Rick was drafted by the Toronto Argonauts but chose to enter engineering instead. In later years his love of sports was reflected in his role as Chairman of the Board of Governors at the Ted Reeve Arena, a position he held for 20 years.

Ross Willam Richards (1925-2011) died suddenly while on a ski vacation at Mont Blanc, Quebec doing what he loved.

Hilary and Bob Rowland died in May and July 2009 respectively. Both attended Malvern Collegiate as did their five children, Michael, Julie, Sara, Susan, and Hugh. Bob started his career at Humberside C.I. and soon moved to his alma mater where he taught industrial arts for many years. Mr.

Rowland, sir, (as he was known) was a dedicated teacher whose influence at Malvern was not limited to the classroom. He coached several teams including badminton, swimming, hockey and tennis. He finished his teaching career at Don Mills C.I., eventually retiring in 1989. Hilary was an avid volunteer in the Beach community and a pillar of several Home & School Associations in the area. She was a great supporter of many local initiatives that

included delivering the *Beach Metro News* (formerly the *Ward Nine News*) and coordinating the Beach Sesquicentennial Quilt that still hangs in the Main Street library. Bob and Hilary moved to Napanee, Ontario in the late 1990s, but always considered the Beach to be their home.

Malvern's Paula Warder Receives Special Award at the CNE (Text by Donna McGraw, edited)

In her latter capacity, she has been collecting data for a book on the history of women's baseball. Congratulations, Paula!
